Most of us can probably relate to Tami's eternal quest to have a clean and organized home, but she feels it never is. Tami looks forward to meeting all the wonderful AAUW members and expanding her circle of friends.

Tech Trek Returned!

After a long three-year hiatus, the Tech Trek STEM camp for girls returned in July to the delight of the six Chico eighth graders who attended: Greta Nikolai, Phuong Le, Caitlin Edwards, Aislin Rhonek, Raoisle McDonald, and Jasmine Ponce are from most of the Chico middle schools. The girls spent a week living in a dorm at UC Davis – with a roommate — dining in the Commons, and spending all morning in their chosen core classes: Anatomy/Physiology, Genetics, Environmental Engineering, and two new core classes: Nutrition/Food Science and Media Arts/Computer Science.

Each afternoon offered different workshops from "Behind the Scenes at Mondavi Center for the Arts (lights, sound – physics), a visit to the Bohart Entomology Museum (live and not live insects), experimenting along with chemistry graduate students, forensics (always popular), Lives of Paramedics/EMTs, Girls with Confidence, and much more. The high point of the week is our tour of the world-famous School of Veterinary Medicine.Evenings presented "Bite of Reality" where they learned about budgeting and keeping safe financially (they love this – really!), Professional Women's Evening where they talk to women with truly interesting careers in STEM, how to get to college – and more.
