We have invited speakers who will talk about two important local service agencies: Cori Miller from the Peg Taylor Center and Mary Neumann from Passages will discuss what they offer in terms of opportunities for volunteer work and vital client services for friends and loved ones.

The goal of Passages is to help people stay healthy at any age and to improve the lives of adults in the 10 Northstate communities they serve. Mary Neumann will talk about their services, including volunteer recruitment and training. Their volunteers and staff provide clients with assistance on legal questions and with short-term counseling. They also offer nutrition planning, care-giver respite services, and transportation to in-house services.



Cori Miller from the Peg Taylor Center will talk about their work in providing care and support for families in need in Butte, Glenn and Tehama Counties. This center pioneered adult day care and transportation services. They also reach out to participants ranging in age from 24 to 104. Clients include diabetics and people dealing with strokes and

Parkinson's disease . They will soon be expanding their services so come and find out about these two organizations where many of the services are free.
