Celebrating Science at Sierra View School The Parent Teacher Organization (PTO) at Sierra View Elementary School reached out to AAUW and asked if any of our members could help judge projects or provide an award or certificate recognizing a particularly good project at their science fair.

Members **Jan Britton** and **Jana Lawton** were able to help out the PTO by judging projects and leaving helpful comments for the young scientists. Jan and Jana identified two projects that exemplified projects with an understanding of the scientific method of discovery. Second graders, Adi Leedine and Brielle Harvey, developed an eco friendly cleaning product to eliminate harmful chemicals and waste bottles in our landfills. They had 5 people test it out. Hand-drawn graphs showed their results. From their hypothesis to the conclusion, it was a winning project. Kelly Weiss, a lst grader, demonstrated a very exciting exploration of acids and bases. Her project, a pumpkin volcano, used different combinations of baking soda and vinegar to create the "lava flow." She, too, included all the elements of a good experiment. We were happy to award gift certificates for books from AAUW to these three students .
