Marcia Moore is a cardiologist (now retired) who has been in Chico in private practice since 1986. She and her husband, Jim Cornyn, also a cardiologist, moved here from the Bay Area in part because there was a spot for two cardiologists. Jim was primarily in Paradise and Marcia, primarily in Chico. They lived on the Skyway, almost half way between the two hospitals. Jim, unfortunately, died of a heart attack in 2000, three weeks short of his 49th birthday. Marcia continued her cardiology work until 2017. She was very active for over a decade with the American Heart Association, locally and regionally, and was the president of the Western States Affiliate of the AHA. She was a founding member of the Gateway Science Museum, on the College of Natural History and Biology Department Advisory Boards at Chico State and, at present, serves on the Governing Board of Chico State. She has been active with the Chico Housing Action Team (CHAT), Safe Space, League of Women Voters and the OLLI program, both as a teacher and class member. She loves travel, books, theater, and classical and folk music.

Marcia was born (during the war years) in Richmond, Virginia, but grew up in Iowa. She earned her BA in sociology from Carleton College in Northfield, Minnesota where she was strongly and positively influenced by a class on racism in America and spent a semester on exchange to Spelman College in Atlanta. That led her to become a Freedom School activist/teacher/voter registration worker in Mississippi during Freedom Summer - a profoundly life-changing event for her which has guided her subsequent activities in civil rights and diversity issues. A few years out of Carleton, she realized her high school dream of becoming a physician. By that time, she had moved to Berkeley and had a son, Martin, with her first husband, Bob. She did all her pre-med at U.C. Berkeley, then received her medical degree from UCSF and did her internship, residency and fellowship at UC Davis/Martinez VA hospital. She often encourages young people to follow their dreams, no matter how remote or difficult they may seem.

Marcia occasionally writes letters to the ER editor when she feels passionate about sharing some of her views. With interests in diversity, social justice, women's reproductive rights and climate emergencies, Marcia's days of retirement are full. She continues to support education and encourages youth to find a career that would make them happy.
