By joining AAUW, we belong to a community that breaks through educational and economic barriers so that all women and girls have a fair chance.


AAUW membership is open to all graduates holding a recognized associate (or equivalent), baccalaureate, or higher degree from a qualified educational institution.

The end of the AAUW fiscal year is June 30. That means it will soon be time to renew your membership in AAUW. Most members renew on this anniversary date. People who recently joined AAUW at a different time of year (say in January) will renew on that anniversary date.

Those whose membership needs to be renewed by June 30 will receive an email reminder from Katrina Breese in our Washington, DC office. The link to renew online is in her message. If you are comfortable with paying via credit card and navigating a relatively simple form on your computer, you should take the opportunity to renew your membership this way.

You can still pay by check if you prefer. Make out your check in the amount of \$110.00 payable to **AAUW Chico** and mail it to our branch treasurer: C/O 25 Abbott Circle, Chico, CA 95973. The \$110 amount for dues includes \$72 to the Association, \$20 to AAUW California, and \$18 to the Chico branch.

A special note for NEW members. If you invited friends to join AAUW, they can join for the first time at a reduced price of \$74 if they get their membership application and check to treasurer by May 10. The Association is offering 50% off their portion of the dues but this is a limited time offer and Lyn needs to get the appropriate paperwork submitted by their deadline.

Their aspirations seemed to be more modest and yet there were people along the way who encouraged them, believed in them, mentored them, even goaded them, to reach higher. We have all benefited from their leadership in that unique way that often happens when women not only have a seat at the table but are seated at the head of the table.

I count AAUW, and the friendships I have developed through this organization, as *my* motivators. You have encouraged me, helped me, inspired me, and put me in positions to do more than I thought I could. Because of what AAUW does in the community, and our impact even beyond Chico, I want to help get things done. Ann Schwab has a wonderful touchstone "life is for learning." If I had to come up with one for myself it would be "do what you can." I am very appreciative of this honor. Thank you.

Women of Distinction



We had a wonderful turnout for the Women of Distinction program but we know that not everyone could attend. Here are a few highlights: **Ann Schwab**'s mother died at an early age and that quickly thrust her into taking on important responsibilities for her family. That carried through in all of her endeavors. In terms of her community activism, she learned about the importance of being both behind the dais and in front if you want to get things done. Members of Chico Velo volunteered on many commissions over the years and thus helped shape Chico into a widely-recognized bike friendly city. When she was mayor she conducted meetings using important tenets including LISTEN and CIVILITY.



Juanita Mottley opened her remarks with a story about why she finished college at such a young age. Her mother wouldn't let her get married until she had gone to college. Wanting to get on with her life as fast as she could, she opted for a degree in business and worked like mad to finish up by age 19 and then she got married. That dedication and determination have served her well throughout her career. Her training and education did not stop as a teen, though, and she went on to earn a nursing and MBA degrees. She arrived at Chico State just in time to deal with the campus response to both the Camp Fire and the COVID-19 pandemic and her life was a whirlwind of constantly changing goalposts, 16 hour days, and almost continuous Zoom meetings. She was given the ultimate initiation and now feels she can handle just about anything. She is looking forward to a little less hectic life as the Associate Vice President for Student Support Services.



Kelly Staley always wanted to teach and became an English teacher after college. Then she was asked to step into the role as interim principal. That word "interim" has popped up more than once in her career. Asked to do the job while the search was on for someone else. She proved that she was up to the jobs and the need to find someone else disappeared. That was the way she started out as the superintendent for Chico Unified. She has been a hands-on administrator, often visiting schools and talking to students and teachers, unlike many of her predecessors. One of her principles is "work hard." She doesn't leave the office until she has returned every phone call and answered every email message. She admitted that her husband often doesn't see as much of her as her staff does.



Being good at sports was something that **Gayle Hutchinson** acknowledged influenced her decisions about college. Her family had no expectations that she would attend college like her brothers. Title IX had been instituted and Gayle was able to attend college on an athletic scholarship. She often used sports metaphors like not winning every game but getting back up and trying again to describe her career path. She loved teaching and student success was important to her. People who knew and worked with her saw that she had qualities that would make her an effective leader in places other than the classroom. So began her ascent from professor, to department chair, to dean, to provost, and finally to president of CSU, Chico. Diversity, equity, and inclusion are not just words to her. As with AAUW, they are her words to live by.

A special joy of the day was being introduced to 6 young women whom Pam Bodnar described as "our future women of distinction." Four of them were 8th

grade students who had gone to Tech Trek camp in the summer of 2022. Each briefly talked about what the camp experience meant to them. "We actually did hands-on stuff every day. This made science so much fun." and "We got to meet women who have these amazing careers." "Being around people that love learning like I do was exciting." The other two students had just been selected as campers for Tech Trek camp at UC, Davis in July. A little more shy than the other four, Pam asked them questions about the application process, which they answered forth-rightly.



It is a satisfying experience to be able to meet these women and learn about their career journey and to acknowledge that we appreciate their contributions to our community. We will likely continue this program into the future.
