Women's equality: the fight continues

Recently AAUW stood in support of students affected by the Trump-era Title IX rule, which not only placed new barriers in the way of survivors of sexual misconduct coming forward, but, for most victims, eliminated the possibility altogether. As a result of our protest and those of students across the country, the current Department of Education announced that new, updated rules will be announced in March. Stay tuned. TITLE IX: No person in the United States, on the basis of sex, should be excluded from participation in, be denied the benefits of or subjected to discrimination under any education program or activity receiving Federal financial assistance." Title IX, Education Amendments of 1972.

The Equal Rights Amendment was first introduced in December 1923. Yes, one hundred years ago! And, with some current legal changes, we need this more than ever. The U.S. is the only modern democracy that does not include sex equality in its Constitution. Without the ERA in the Constitution, advances in women's rights that we took for granted are at risk of being weakened or even reversed. Just think if the Equal Rights Amendment had been ratified and published as the 28th Amendment, the outcome of the Dobbs decision could have been totally different. Affirming the ERA as the 28th Amendment will strengthen legal protections against discrimination based on sex. Finalizing the amendment would likely provide additional support for new and existing protections against sex discriminations in areas including education, the workplace, and access to reproductive health care. And thanks to the recent Supreme Court case Bostock v. Clayton County (2020), the ERA includes sexual orientation and gender identity. When the time comes for us to write our legislators in favor of this long-overdue governing structure, we will let you know.

In April all AAUW members will be asked to vote on a change to membership requirements. Currently, one must have at least an A.A. degree or equivalent. AAUW and other organizations consider this a discriminating barrier and would prefer an open membership, welcoming anyone who supports our mission - To advance gender equity for women and girls through research, education, and advocacy.

AAUW started, in 1881, admitting any woman with a four-year degree from a very small group of select colleges. Racial discrimination persisted until the Civil Rights Movement; men were welcomed in the mid-1980s, and the 4-year degree was then replaced by the 2-year requirement. So, there is precedent for updating as society changes.

Over the years I have heard from members about removing the degree requirement; they all worried that the culture of AAUW would change if open to all. We worried about that when it was proposed that men would join and "take over." That did not happen. What did happen was that we have more members who work hard for the things we all care about and we do need all the help we can get.
