WOMEN OF DISTINCTION AWARDS SATURDAY, APRIL 26, 3-5 PM ST. JOHN'S EPISCOPAL CHURCH HALL 2341 FLORAL AVENUE, CHICO

We received a number of nominations for our *Women of Distinction* awards. Having so many capable women from which to choose made it especially difficult to make the final selections but the committee appreciated all the people who took the time to provide their suggestions. We are honoring four women who have provided leadership in their workplace and our community. They are dedicated to public service and work within the North State to find solutions to area concerns. All are outstanding role models for young women and the greater community through their leadership and scholarship. Each award recipient has agreed to attend our award ceremony and will give a short talk.

This event is an important way for our AAUW branch to recognize and celebrate women. It also highlights how we all benefit by having women in leadership positions; one of AAUW's core missions. We encourage you to attend, invite a spouse or friend, and give our 2025 women of distinction a rousing show of support. You can also help by bringing some finger food to add to the reception. More information about that will be coming in an email next week. The following nominees will receive our 2025 *Women of Distinction* award.

Alexa Benson-Valavanis. She has served as the president and CEO of the North Valley Community Foundation (NVCF) since 2005. Hired to rebuild the foundation, Benson-Valavanis mobilized entrepreneurs and philanthropists locally and around the globe to provide funding and help. Under her leadership, the foundation has grown from serving a handful of clients to more than 500 while engaging thousands of donors and generating revenue of more than \$180 million for causes in Northern California and worldwide. During the Camp Fire she transformed the NVCF into the lead philanthropic organization for the relief and recovery efforts. She also developed another response team to COVID-19 to help provide relief to at-risk populations. She also serves on numerous advisory committees and boards.

Dolores Mitchell. She is well known in our community for her dedication to bringing the world of art to Chico. First, as a professor at California State University, Chico for 30 years, as a founder of the local Avenue 9 Gallery, and last, by her many community-wide presentations and exhibits. Through her teaching of art history, she helped her students gain cultural awareness, develop critical thinking and analytical skills, and

learn how to suss out the story behind the art piece. Mitchell was a firm believer in the idea that art shows us what was important and valuable to different cultures over time. To promote her art and that of other local artists, Mitchell publishes her monthly newsletter, *Art Talk.* The newsletter often includes a theme that helps explain the artistic process. In service to the arts, she has left a legacy of sharing and promoting art and is still going strong well into her 90s.

Anastacia Snyder-Lando. As executive director of Catalyst Domestic and Sexual Violence Services in Butte and Glenn counties, Anastacia Snyder-Lando is responsible for the overall management of the agency's operations. Catalyst is dedicated to providing victims with vital safe housing and other services, including a 24/7 hotline, free short-term therapy, legal and law enforcement advocacy, and other essential services for adults and their children. In addition to Catalyst, Snyder-Lando holds many state and local leadership positions, including the governor's appointment to the California Office of Emergency Services, the FEMA Board, and is an elected member of the Butte County Continuum of Care Council.

Linda Watkins-Bennett. Linda Watkins-Bennett is a long-time veteran of local journalism, and recently spoke at AAUW's Women in the Media event. Born and raised in Chico, Watkins-Bennett has years of experience at KHSL TV since graduating from California State University, Chico. A journalist for over 30 years, she brings into focus an in-depth understanding of changes and concerns in Chico and the entire North State. She is currently anchor of *Action News Now* at noon and the 4 pm time slot. She believes it is important to remain fair, balanced, and impartial in presenting the news to North State residents.

We have always championed the rights of women, but it's pretty clear we need to up the ante more than ever or risk the undoing of so much we have fought for since 1881.

Get Political—But, Not Partisan. Take a stand and make your voice heard. It's the political process and give and take that determines our public policy. Use AAUW's Public Policy

Priorities as a guide for your efforts but also educate yourself about what other groups are doing. It's important to collaborate and share ideas! PS—If you want to go beyond political to partisan, just remember not to do so in the name of AAUW.

As AAUW members, focus on these important issues. Both are at the heart of AAUW's mission.

1. The value of our higher education system which is foundational to women achieving greater economic security and assuming high-level leadership roles.

2. The need to continue to reduce and eliminate barriers that hold women back.

Here are some simple steps to get started on these issues.

At the National Level

Sign up to be an <u>AAUW Two-Minute Activist</u> and get your friends to sign up too. You don't have to be an AAUW member to use our Two-Minute Activist program. Actually respond when the call comes to send a note via our Two-Minute Activist program and personalize your introduction.

Write to Doug LaMalfa, our Congressional Representative, and Alex Padilla and Adam Schiff, our Senators, asking them for their support of higher education, diversity, and women's rights.

Support AAUW's *Greatest Needs Fund* to help us increase our public policy and advocacy work.

At the State level

Email, write, or call Assemblymember James Gallagher and State Senator Megan Dahle. Tell them we are counting on them to build and maintain safeguards into California law in support of women's rights.

Call your college or university alumni association or the president's office to find out how that institution is responding to executive orders and what you can do to support your alma mater in these difficult times. Emphasize the importance of graduate-level programs and fellowships for women.

<u>Locally</u>

Tell everyone you know how important it is to keep Title IX protections for women on campus, and to continue diversity, equity, and inclusion efforts. Intentionally include folks whose perspective you may not agree with in your conversations. AAUW has webinars you can watch on their website on how to manage difficult conversations with those who might not agree with us.

Write an op ed or letter to the editor in the ER about our values and how they are being denigrated.

Support local nonprofits, including Chico AAUW, with your talent and time, to help keep them working in this chaotic environment.
