## AAUW FINANCIAL NEWS

As of April 1, 2025, National AAUW increased their dues by **\$2**, making their dues for 2025-2026 **\$74**. AAUW-CA is also increasing their dues for 2025-2026 by **\$10** to a total of **\$30**. AAUW-CA has not increased their dues for many years. With so many things increasing that affect business (such as rent, electricity, and postage), the increase seems prudent so they can continue to carry on a vital business.

# Public Policy

## LOBBY DAYS

Once a year AAUW California (AAUW-CA) organizes a day for us to visit our legislators in Sacramento and discuss three Assembly and/or Senate bills AAUW is concerned about. This April 8 I met with members Michelle Rasmussen and Jan Britton to do just that. Our team was joined by Claudia Chandler and Gwyn Baker of the Marysville-Yuba City branch.

After a coffee and pastry brunch in the offices of Kathy Van Osten, AAUW-CA's legislative advocate, and a pep talk by AAUW-CA Public Policy chair Missy Maceyco, we spread out and met with staff members of Assemblyman James Gallagher and the staffs of two other representatives.

The bills we discussed were **Senate Bill 418** which **AAUW supports**. If passed, health care coverage will not be denied to people on the basis of race, color, national origin, age, disability, or sex. The bill would define discrimination on the basis of sex to include, among other things, sex characteristics, including intersex traits, pregnancy, and gender identity.

**Senate Bill 771** would extend protections from social media abuse because of the person's political affiliation, race, or sexual orientation, and punishes violations of that law with certain civil penalties or misdemeanors. **AAUW supports this bill.**

**Assembly Bill 579** is one **AAUW opposes**. It has to do with whether parental lack of support to recognize a child's wish to use a different pronoun than that assigned at birth and refusal to allow gender affirming care for that child is classified as child abuse. (This bill was later withdrawn.)

# Public Policy - cont'd

## STILL FIGHTING FOR EQUALITY

AAUW has a long history of advocating for policies that advance equity in education, economic security, and civil rights. Now more than ever, branches can have a critical impact in the fight for equity. Our own branch, as well as individual members, can take meaningful action to advance our mission of equity for women and girls. We can demonstrate commitment to non-partisan advocacy aligned with AAUW public policy priorities. We welcome ideas and input from our members on programs that would help us participate in this dialog. Let's get inspired by real examples from AAUW members around the country!

### Deepen Understanding of Key Issues

- **AAUW Manhattan (KS)** branch hosted city commissioners and staff from the U.S. Senator's office for a round-table discussion on AAUW's mission and AAUW of Kansas legislative priorities.
- **AAUW Boise Area (ID)** branch hosted a conversation with a parent of a transgender youth to explore gender identity, current state and federal laws, and how to be a better advocate.

### Build Coalitions and Be Allies

- **AAUW Indiana County (PA)** branch partnered with a local theater for a free public screening of *Ratified*, a documentary on Virginia's ratification of the Equal Rights Amendment.
- **AAUW Birmingham (AL)** branch visited the Hispanic and Immigration Center of Alabama (HICA) to learn how they support immigrant families with community resources.

### Engage in the Policy Process

- **AAUW California** launched a "School Board Project" to mobilize members to speak out at school board meetings against book banning, curriculum censorship, and anti-LGBTQ+ policies. The training to be an effective speaker at school board meetings is available and your voices are needed.
- **AAUW Northwest Valley (AZ)** branch trained members on the state's "Request to Speak" program, enabling them to submit comments and request to speak on bills in committee.

Planning for programs and branch strategies for our 2025-2026 season will take place during the summer and we'd like to involve our members in the process. Be on the look out for a reminder email message so you can participate.

## VOTING AAUW CALIFORNIA

Your ballot to select the way forward for AAUW-California (AAUW-CA) was sent to your email on Saturday, April 26. Look for a message from “siteadmin@aauw-ca.org” with “2025 AAUW California Election” in the subject line. Members without email were mailed paper ballots. Eligible voters are those who were members as of March 14, 2025.

The ballot has three parts.

1. *Will you approve the latest public policy directions?* (See my Public Policy article in this edition for a brief description.)
2. *Will you approve a \$10/year increase in state dues?* That is, from \$20 to \$30.  
**NOTE: this is the first increase in 10 years!**
3. *Vote for two new members of the AAUW-CA board of directors.* (I have information and an opinion on these; if you wish more information, contact me by text or email.)

## DO YOU FAVOR THESE IDEAS? YOU WILL BE VOTING YES OR NO ON YOUR AAUW-CA BALLOT

Every two years our Public Policy Committee reviews the emphasis that will direct our legislative advocate in Sacramento as she interacts with our legislators about Senate and Assembly bills concerned with these efforts. They also guide our members as they attend meetings of city councils, school boards, and interact with the media. The priorities for 2025-2027 include the following,

**Economic Security for All Women**, including equity in the workplace, enforcement of anti-discrimination statutes, security in retirement, access to job training for career development, and work-life balance, including access to quality affordable childcare and paid sick and care-giving leave.

**Social and Racial Justice for All Members of Society**, including Reproductive health, equal access to affordable housing, freedom from violence, guaranteed civil and constitutional rights for all, protection and expansion of voting rights, and support for United Nations sustainable development goals concerning human rights and women and girls' concerns.

### **Equal Access to Quality Public Education**

Vigorous enforcement of Title IX, equitable funding at all educational levels, removal of barriers to girls in STEM fields, civic instruction in ALL high schools, accurate historical information, access to resources including technology.

### **Increased Representation of Women**

Leadership roles on corporate boards, access to leadership skills training, and programs to promote public service careers.
