GENDER EQUITY IN SPORTS AND TITLE IX UNDER THE TRUMP ADMINISTRATION

AAUW advances gender equity for women and girls through advocacy, education, and research.

By joining AAUW, we belong to a community that breaks through educational and economic barriers so that all women and girls have a fair chance.

AAUW membership is open to all graduates holding a recognized associate (or equivalent), baccalaureate or higher degree from a qualified education institution.

In principle and in practice, AAUW values and seeks diverse membership, there shall be no barriers to full participation in this organization on the basis of gender, race, creed, age, sexual orientation, national origin, disability, or class.

Chico's AAUW will host a discussion on *Gender Equity in Sports Under the Trump Administration*. Dr. Cindy Wolff will address an update on equity in sports in Chico. In 2012, Wolff and the Chico AAUW branch submitted a complaint to the California Office of Civil Rights, under Title IX, concerning the equity of women's sports in the Chico Unified School District (CUSD). Wolff did this while concomitantly serving as a Chico State faculty member and as the founder of the non-profit Center for Healthy Communities. As a result of the complaint, girls in Chico now have the same access to sports facilities that boys have always had. And, the Center garnered more than \$50 million in grants and contracts to provide services to Northstate residents.



The Trump administration is in the process of shutting down the Department of Education that helped provide some funding for Title IX. Because of this, Wolff will address questions concerning how the original 2012 complaint affected sports gender equity in our tri-county region, how Title IX affected sports gender equity requirements in the CUSD, and how the Trump administration affects funding for gender equity in sports.

Hello Friends,

Did you ever find yourself wondering what a “woke” agenda was? It is often portrayed as something that is objectionable, something to be rooted out of our politics, our educational system, our military, our workplaces, and institutions. The word’s origins are rooted in African American culture. Black people had to be awake, aware, paying attention to, and conscious of racial injustice and institutional inequality. Oftentimes their lives or well-being depended on being *woke*.

Current usage has seemingly morphed the word into an epithet. It’s a catch-all phrase used in our culture war to include “stuff we don’t like,” that is, talk about gender, race, climate change, history, among others. Our country has never had cultural values, beliefs, or ideologies in which there was 100% agreement. Over time norms change as we strive for that more perfect union. People with a woke agenda seek to change the status quo, or one which puts them in a position with less access to things like jobs, education, healthcare, housing, and transportation.

People who disparage others as being “woke” don’t want the status quo to change. They like the privilege and power they have. Fortunately, achieving equity is not a zero sum proposition. That is why AAUW believes in, and advocates for, DEI (diversity, equity, and inclusion). Think about the beautiful meanings of those three words,

INCLUSION - embrace differences so that individuals or groups feel welcome, respected, supported, valued and able to fully participate.

EQUITY - the quality of being fair and just.

DIVERSITY - psychological, physical, and social differences that occur among any and all individuals. Our country is populated with people with differences such as mental and physical abilities, socioeconomic status, marital status, ethnicity, gender, and religions. All of these physical, social, and cultural characteristic *can* coexist.

Embrace the DEI vision in your daily lives and do what you can in your corner of the world to advance that AAUW vision for the good of all. Remember, a small pebble thrown into a big lake has a wide “ripple effect.”

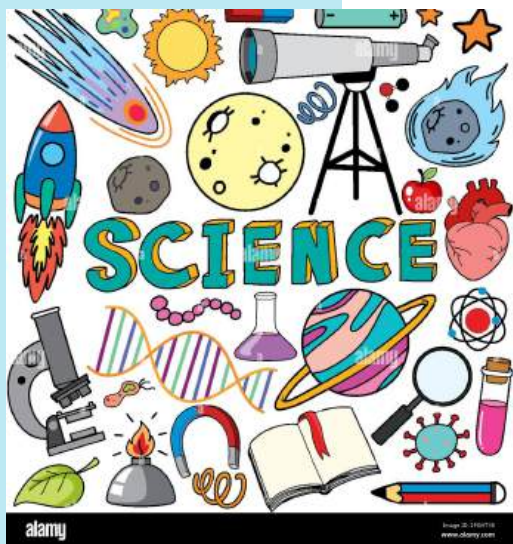

SUPPORT STUDENTS AT SIERRA VIEW SCHOOL



Butte County no longer has a traditional science fair, but teachers at Sierra View Elementary School have been continuing the tradition. Last year, they had 70 students participate in 45 projects! The parents and school faculty want to encourage them to stay curious and be life-long scientists who understand how to use the scientific method.

The Fair this year will take place in their Multipurpose Room on Tuesday, February 17. Judging takes place from 8:30 to 11 am.

They are looking for local scientists and/or scientifically-minded people to help judge student projects. Participation in judging can be very flexible. You are welcome to come and judge as many projects as you have time for during that time frame. In the past, volunteers have come for as little as 45 minutes while others have stayed the whole time so they could judge each project. At the start, you will be given a rubric to use while awarding points to each project in various categories. No students will be present during the judging.

In the past, our branch has had non-scientist members judge projects so it is not difficult. It is definitely fun to see what young minds come up with as they explore science. Our branch awards two certificates of merit along with \$25 gift cards from Barnes and Noble for two students we agree put out a commendable effort on their projects. **Let Jana know if you are interested in volunteering before Feb 17 so she can contact the school coordinator.**

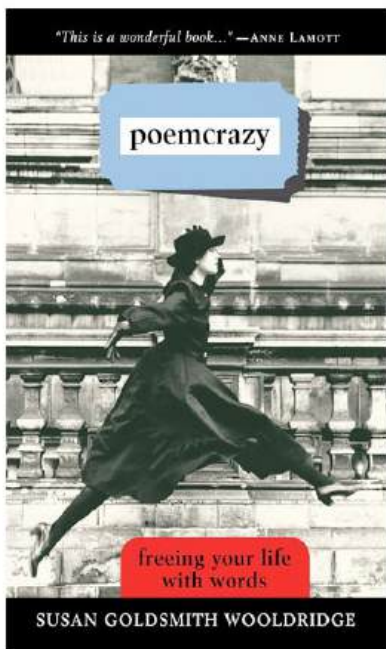


FREE WRITING WORKSHOP

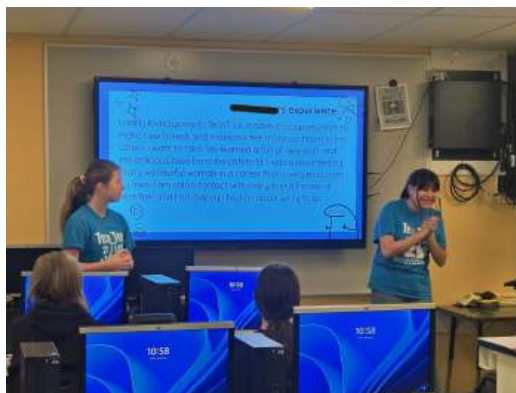

2026 NEW ELECTIONS

Because of the untimely death of Congressman Doug LaMalfa, we have two elections coming up—with two completely different sets of rules. The summer election to fill the Congressional District 1 seat until January will be held under the *old* district lines. The November election for the full two-year term will see our district separated from some more northern counties and added to a few over by the coast. Confusing, yes, but very, very interesting. So far, Assemblyman James Gallagher and Chico's own Audrey Denney plan to run. So, enter AAUW.



Members of AAUW Chico's Lobby Day team are planning to meet with staff members for Assemblyman Gallagher (AD 3) and State Senator Megan Dahle (S1) – or, in the best of all possible circumstances—with Gallagher and Dahle in person.

During these meetings in local district offices, the Lobby Day Team will discuss three bills before the California Senate and Assembly. Team members will have talking points on why AAUW does or does not support a particular bill and ask for the member's vote in that direction.

Our Lobby Day team includes two members from the Marysville-Yuba City branch and three from Chico: co-branch president Michelle Rasmussen, newsletter editor Anne Russell, and public policy chair Carol Holzgrafe.

Based on last year's experience, we look forward to lively discussions about legislation of great interest to AAUW California.
